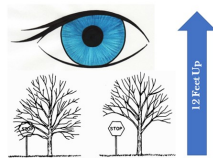

Meeting Minutes

Unapproved Minutes from the August 16, 2021 City Council Meeting Submitted by Council Member Dawn Bulera

Lake St. Croix Beach City Council 5:30 Budget Meeting Minutes and Regular Council Meeting 6:00, August 16th, 2021 Zoom Meeting

5:30 pm---Those present: Dave Engstrom, Mary Paul, Tom McCarthy, Dawn Bulera, Deb Campbell, Cindie Reiter, Dick Schneider, John Parrotti, Kate Piscitello, Noah Bluesky.

Budget meeting--City Clerk DE introduced preliminary proposed budget. This is a brief overview, and another longer meeting will be scheduled to go over the proposed budget. MP stated this budget is overall a \$10,000 decrease from last year, decreasing certified levy by approximately 2% compared to last year. Market values went up in this area, it is up 4.1% for the taxable market values. With that increase the local tax capacity will go up 4.4%. The first page is a summary page of entire budget. The first section is the summary of expenses. The first column is what was budgeted 2020, the second is 2021. Then the proposed for 2022 for comparison. The overall fund expenses are first line, that is slightly over what we increased in that area and we will go over those, they are up about \$24,000. The transfers to the street improvement fund, it is the LGA (Local Government Aid) transfers not the extra funds from the transfers from the General Fund. Other transfers are to Parks Fund or Long-Term Improvement Fund or other transfers or the year, and then the Fire Hall debt service expense.

The second section of the page is summary of non-levy fund sources. These are the funds that come from outside our tax levy i.e., the LGA funding and Small City Assistance Fund but no amount was put in the budget. The city received did something this year but we do not know what we will get this next year. The Licensing and Permits will stay the same. Councilmember Reiter asked about the Small City Assistance being a two-year funding and could we budget for this. DE stated the city can't budget for this as we do not know what we will get in September as the State is still in the discussion phase. The city received \$29,800 this year, \$14,900 in July as the first half per MP. Councilmember Bulera asked why we have a zero balance, MP stated because we did not receive any funds in 2020, and we were not aware of it coming in 2021. DE stated the state could change the way they allocate funds. MP stated the city should know before the final budget is approved. Councilmember JP Armstrong joined meeting at 5:50 pm. MP more non-levy funds of beach parking and permits, cable commission, other small revenues coming in.

The last section is the summary of the certified levy funding showing the amounts we will be asking for in our tax levy. The Fire Hall Debt Service Levy confirmed at \$12,306.00, we have not gotten the fiscal disparity yet but last year's number was input until the final number is received, and the general property tax levy is what the city is working on right now. Councilmember CR asked that the Fire Hall Debt Service Levy be changed to Fire Hall Debt Service Allocation.

Page B1 show prior year actuals including 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020. The year 2021 is not complete as there are some missing bills in July. The budget approved for 2021 is shown and the proposed numbers for 2022. It was stated again, without having the fiscal disparity numbers, the general property tax levy can't be decided. The Cable Commission numbers are higher but will be at last

year's \$13,000. Business licenses and permits stayed the same.

Page B2 there is an increase for the LGA because we have been notified of the amount. The Recycling Grant was lower in 2021 and that amount was entered for 2022. The Small City Assistance amount will be added if the city is notified. Newsletter sponsors amount was increased to \$2400. Clean Up Day is in Long Term Fund because LSCB sponsors the event and it does not affect the budget.

Page B3 had discussion about the Beach Park Permits increased to \$60,000 because of the increase in fees and use.

Page B4 increased Legal Services after receiving notice of a rate increase of the hourly fee from \$160 to \$165.

CMCR asked a few items to be focused on. Heritage Days to have a \$1200 budget from General Fund every year. The roof is to be repaired/replaced for an estimated \$125,000. The \$5,000 for sewer/water mains should be eliminated. CMDDB asked to increase for Weed Control, Vegetative Management, and the Tree Program for future projects focusing on invasives.

6:00 Regular Council Meeting for August 16,2021. Present Dave Engstrom, Kate Piscitello, Mary Paul, Deb Campbell, Noah Bluesky, Dawn Bulera, JP Armstrong, Cindie Reiter, Tom McCarthy, Annie McCahery, John Parotti, Michael Morehouse, Karen Riley, Bonnie Markham, Bruce and Eunice Swanson, Linda O'Donnell, Chris Smith, Dick and Nancy Schneider.

Call to Order 6:00 pm. Pledge of Allegiance. All Councilmembers in attendance. Approve the Agenda-M/S-McCarthy/Reiter-Added 9C--City Hall Roof Repairs. 5:0. Approve Minutes with change that the Heritage Day was funded from charitable gaming but would be the General Fund in the future. M/S-McCarthy/Reiter. 4:0:1 (Bluesky abstain, as he wasn't present for the July meeting).

Public input: One was sent in as an email.

Chris Smith, 1721 Ramada Ave S. -Mr. Smith submitted a written comment about a dog incident and asked it be included in the meeting packet. Mr. Smith has received conflicting information from officials and has not received any documentation from the city or WCSO, but received calls from Animal Control threatening seizure and euthanizing, unless removed. Mr. Smith and Ms. Hoaglund have complied and removed the dog from the city. But the lack of due process, documentation, and communication is concerning. LSCB has one of the strictest ordinances in the state. Mr. Smith asks the Council to direct staff to allow the dog to return home until the investigation and appeal have been concluded. The Clerk asked the Attorney to speak about the Washington County Sheriff's report and the copy of the notice of Declaration of a potentially dangerous dog that Mr. Smith should have received in the mail. There is a process and Mr. Smith and Ms. Hoaglund can appeal, but it is recommended that this matter not be discussed further until the hearing officer appointment can be scheduled including the Animal Control Officer.

Richard Schneider, 1444 Ramada Ave S. -Regarding the ordinance for Accessory Apartments, it should be required that the properties be owner occupied, which is often the law in other small cities, WBL as an example. Non-owner-occupied Accessory Apartments blurs the difference between single family homes and multifamily dwellings and attracts investors and may changes the nature of the neighborhood. Also, it is regrettable that the Planning Commission and City Council

have chosen to allow a ruling from 1956 to prevent the DNR from enforcing a ruling that was a result of the National Wild Rivers Act 1968. The overlay area (Riverway District) should not be included in the Accessory Apartments Ordinance. As a city are we not good stewards of the St. Croix River?

Nancy Schneider, 1444 Ramada Ave. S.-Live here 40 years. The residents have written letters, emails, and calling Council Members and Planning Commissioners and does not feel that we/they are being listened to and the concerns are not being addressed regarding the Accessory Apartments Ordinance. The information from the Planning Commission and the DNR about a ruling so old and does not take into the consideration the issues about the environment that are current today. And the letters written recently have addressed issues of septic, parking, and the change in the neighborhood. She asks our small city should not have accessory apartments. Also, the bluffland vegetation management is important for invasive species but is not in favor of cutting everything down, as we are not a tourist town, and what is needed is management by an impartial inspector.

Public safety--Law enforcement and Emergency Response and Fire-CMJPA- Washington County sheriff had 64 calls for LSCB. The Fire Department had 14, 40 years to date. The information was not available for citations. It usually takes a month. The city received the Financial Statements and Independent Auditor's Report for the LSCVF relief Association. Animal Control-CMDB-No calls, the city to paid the monthly fee. CMDB asked that here is notification when there is a serious incident.

Accountant Report-Mary Paul- State of Operations. Significant revenue- received first half of property taxes, recycling grant, and beach parking which was \$30,000. Significant Expenses-Police services for January through June, Engineering costs of \$20,000, and the Max Todo Bluff Stabilization Project payment of \$103,914. In the transfer column, as of June 2021, the city did transfer funds. Statement of Operations shown are 10 pages. The Street Improvement Plan recap 2021. There were future transactions listed to add to the street fund--American Rescue Plan (only for allowable uses) \$30,000, Mn Small City Assistance \$29,800, LGA Funding 2021 \$97,215, General Property Tax Levy 2021 \$22,758. The predicted fund balance at 12/31/21 s \$223,803.00. CMCR suggested the recent approved street improvement contract with SMP be included on the balance sheet, CMNB agreed. Bluffland recap-the city will/has received a check for \$65,000 from the WMO. At the end of the year a transfer will be made if there is a deficit. Discussion about the General Fund. Common practice is to keep 6 months' worth of expenses in the checking account-for our city =\$299,000. Approximately \$420,000 has been our balance in the General Fund. If the 6-month rule applies we could potentially use \$130,00 for projects. Claims to be approved-\$54,352.45, M/S Reiter/McCarthy-some discussion/questions-5:0. Proposal for 12/31/21 Audit by Accountant Michael Pofahl-M/S-McCarthy/Armstrong-Approved 4:0

City Engineer John Parotti-Update- the city awarded a two-city street project on 20th and Queens/Itasca. An open house is scheduled 5-7 pm Thursday 19,2021 at LSCB City Hall for St. Croix Beach residents and St. Mary's Point residents to share information and answer questions. It may be an outdoor event. There is a preliminary schedule to start work for the last week of August on the damaged floodplain streets. The project needs to start on these streets first because FEMA monies need to be spent. The Riviera WMO Project had an on-site meeting from 13th to 18th St. South and some side street locations for small infiltration/water quality practices. Residents have contacted Washington County about some water quality practices/raingardens and are interested

in doing projects. Grants will be pursued. Invasive species has been a concern and the engineer has been approached to give guidance as to what practices may work. The WMO would like to see that the invasives will be managed by a professional company with planting and replacements. WMO project estimate is \$30,000, 75% WMO grant/ 25% \$7,500 will be covered by the city.

City Attorney-Kevin Sandstrom was not present (Annie McSherry as substitute)-MTM suggested that since the City Attorney familiar with the proposed Accessory Apartment Ordinance is not present, it would be better to wait until he is available to discuss any issues. CMNB suggested that the ordinance be sent back to Planning, then other discussion about having a workshop/ revisit the subject given the new/old information about the Long Term, Short Term, and Accessory Apartment Ordinances. Voted to table M/S McCarthy/Bluesky 5:0. Annie McSherry gave an update concerning the pending lawsuit against Robert Lind/Bobcat Lind Properties and Zee's Auto Sales and Repair. A complaint was filed July 13, 2021 seeking an order determining they were in violation of City ordinances for using the property and requiring them to come into compliance. They were served July 26th, 2021. They had 21 days to respond (August 16, 2021 is due date). August 15, 2021 Mr. Lind responded insufficiently; Mr. Lee did not respond. Attorney asked the Council to direct the next step meaning we are in a position to pursue a Default Judgement. M/S Bluesky/Reiter. Discussion about a past resolution (sometime in 2000's, prior 2006) concerning other permits for the same resident being revoked, Attorney stated research needs to be done but feels this lawsuit may not affect other permits. 5:0.

Staff Reports--Parks Commission has recommended August 25,2021 for Beach Clean Up Day, 6 pm. MTM explained that the residents can participate in cleaning/organizing the beach area near their boats/docks/moorings. The Parks Commission recommended that no grills to be brought into the park/beach and loud music not sanctioned by the city be prohibited. Discussion concerning safety of picnicking/grilling in ROW, lost grilling freedom for residents and having music. The Park currently has four stationary grills, discussing adding one or two more. Adding more bins for coals is a concern that guests would use as a trash receptacle which is a safety concern. Loud music could be considered a nuisance, falling under that ordinance. Some of the American Rescue Plan dollars could be used to pay more staff or Sheriff services to get the park/beach area under control. Motion to limit grill use to the designated areas in the park, no grills or fires in the public swimming beach, and no picnicking allowed in the ROW, M/S Bluesky/Rieter 5:0. Parks recommended a \$200 donation to the Lower St. Croix Valley Fire dive team for the work they have done removing debris from the river. M/S Reiter/Bluesky 4:0:1 Armstrong abstained as a member of LSCVF. Parks recommended that some of the American Rescue Plan funds be used to help with the bluff stabilization/filtration management plan. Motion to have staff make a map specifying where the grills are allowed in the park and have it placed in the gazebo pay area M/S Reiter/Bulera 5:0.

The Planning Commission recommends that we refer to the Agricultural Animal Ordinance in place stating that keeping colonies, hives, or keeping of bees are prohibited. Staff is working on a complaint by a resident. Complaints about a vacant home in LSCB have raised issues about how to handle the problem. A resident, Michael Morehead, is retired St. Paul Police Officer working in the regulation of vacant buildings, offered assistance to LSCB. Discussion about a

particular Regulation of vacant buildings, offered assistance to LSCB. Discussion about a particular property that has been at issue and city doing maintenance (lawn mowing) and to tack it on taxes, contacting deceased owner's daughters has been problematic, the structure needs repair, homeless people have lived in it, cats have been living in it. M/S to have the City Attorney proceed with legal action concerning 2011 Quant Avenue S. Bluesky/Armstrong 5:0

No updates for Ordinance Codification or Met Council Comprehensive Plan.

New Business--LSCB EAB Grant has been filled out for August 2021. A management plan has been created for the city to follow that is included in the grant application, removal and replacing 1:1. The city is waiting for the announcement of awards.

The meeting at City Hall August 4, 2021 to discuss the allowable uses for the American Rescue Plan funds. Infrastructure, water quality, community support for homes that need structural attention, public safety at the beach (sheriff/park staff) are possibilities, although the roof repair is not allowable.

Discussion about the repair of the roof has only received one bid, a couple of companies were mentioned for possible other bids, and the need to budget appropriately.

Old Business--none.

Councilmember Reports--

CMJPA-Wasn't able to make it to the August 4, meeting due to work and short notice time.

CMNB- Concerned about the issue of a resident removing a pet from the home immediately when there have been no issues before. Feels the ordinance is something LSCB should look at. Attorney explained the process, a resident commented that the rules that are set up for an initial quarantine period for check of rabies, etc., that can be at the home. The WCSO makes the determination of potentially dangerous dogs. Most cities give one, two, three, or more notices but LSCB is one of a few cities that has no notice or warning before removal, and once a dog is designated potentially dangerous it is not allowed in the city, although the owner has the option to appeal.

CMDB-The Zumba and Yoga classes are in the Riverfront Park. Participants enjoyed the classes. Heritage Day was a success and hopes all of the Council and staff can participate in the future. Working rescheduling the WMO/WCD bluffland shoreland tour (postponed in April) to discuss management.

CMCR-referred to another City having issues about a credit card statements and Council not knowing what is on it. Requests that the original/bill statement be presented in the CC packet. The Zoom meeting link for this council meeting was not available for residents on the website and to make sure the links are available. Asked to put the minutes in the newsletter, with the disclaimer they are UNAPPROVED minutes. Discussion about what should be included, cost of the newsletter. M/S to add detailed minutes to newsletter Reiter/Bulera 4:1.

MTM--Thanked Bob Shearer for all the work he has done at the beach.
